president’s message

I am delighted to share the 2023 Annual Report. So much about the past fiscal year (July 1, 2022–June 30, 2023) demonstrates the great range of expertise, enthusiasm, and momentum that defines this amazing institution in its second hundred years. Much is happening in every corner of The Huntington; if you fail to see a specific highlight in this report, rest assured that it will likely appear in our next annual publication.

As you peruse these pages, I hope you are as astonished as I am by the achievements of our staff, volunteers, donors, and patrons. We acquired the papers of Thomas Pynchon, one of the most important 20th-century writers. We also presented a full range of exhibitions—from the beautiful “Inspiring Walt Disney” to the captivating, modernistic work by the quilters of Gee’s Bend, Alabama, and the stunning collage-based paintings of Nigerian-born, Los Angeles–based artist Njideka Akunyili Crosby. We acquired a jewel of a portrait by celebrated 18th-century French painter Élisabeth Vigée Le Brun, along with a gorgeous David Hockney painting that sits in conversation with a work by Britain’s renowned John Constable, one of the artists who has inspired Hockney. We reopened the exquisitely restored and enhanced Rose Garden Tea Room to the tremendous delight of visitors. Simultaneously, we put the finishing touches on the Japanese Heritage Shōya House, originally built around 1700, for its fall 2023 opening. And all the while we reworked a previously unseen section of the Desert Garden and added more accessible pathways so that everyone can enjoy this magical landscape. We engaged with roughly 16,000 school students and their teachers, awarded some \$1.4 million in fellowship support to 131 long- and short-term fellows, and welcomed a wonderful new director for the research program, Susan Juster.

So much of our work is about building knowledge and cultivating curiosity. We know our historic collections serve as the source for important, contemporary thinking about complicated matters—from race relations to geopolitical conflict, climate change, and beyond. We also know that the collections serve to inspire a range of creators, including writers, poets, performers, designers, and photographers.

In fact, our visitor and membership numbers—more than 1 million visitors annually and some 54,000 member households—continue to reflect the robust connection that people have with The Huntington.

While our programs, exhibitions, and dynamic range of offerings deservedly garner attention, The Huntington is also an important place for respite and restoration—a sanctuary of sorts. Even with all the activity represented in this review of the fiscal year, it’s worth noting that we, too, honor the quiet spaces, and our staff and volunteers work hard to maintain them. I hear repeatedly that The Huntington has never looked more beautiful, and I absolutely agree. There is evidence of tremendous dedication and pride everywhere.

None of this is possible without your generosity. As you read through these pages, I hope you appreciate the degree to which our momentum is propelled by your philanthropy. Together, we are “One Huntington.”

“Gee’s Bend: Shared Legacy”

Sept. 17, 2022–Sept. 4, 2023

Virginia Steele Scott Galleries of American Art

Gee’s Bend, Alabama, is home to one of the most important African American quilt-making traditions in the United States. Prints in this installation were made by members of the Gee’s Bend Quiltmakers’ Collective from Alabama during their artistic residency at Paulson Fontaine Press in Berkeley, California. The pieces were created by pressing original quilted fabric designs face down on a wax-coated printing plate that captured the texture, seams, and stitching of the original fabrics. Through this innovative process, a quilt is translated to a printed surface—a new medium to explore and share the quiltmakers’ creativity. “Gee’s Bend: Shared Legacy” was presented in two six-month installments; each featured a selection of 12 prints by quiltmakers Mary Lee Bendolph, Louisiana Bendolph, Loretta Bennett, and Loretta Pettway. In addition to the prints on display, each installment included one of two quilts by Mary Lee Bendolph, *Diner* (2004) and *Image of Formal Presidents* (2009), which was made to commemorate the historic inauguration of President Barack Obama and first lady Michelle Obama.

“Crafting a Garden: Inside the Creation of Liu Fang Yuan”

The Huntington’s Chinese Garden—known as Liu Fang Yuan, the Garden of Flowing Fragrance—is more than it seems. With its tiled roofs, wooden columns, and inscribed placards, it appears to be a replica of the historical gardens in Suzhou, China, that inspired its design. But underneath those traditional elements are complex layers of materials and ideas unique to the garden’s setting in contemporary California. “Crafting a Garden: Inside the Creation of Liu Fang Yuan” illuminated the intricacies of the Chinese Garden while heightening appreciation of all that it encompasses. On display were models, photographs, tools, and videos that told the story of the design and construction of the garden. These were organized around five fundamental crafts involved in creating the garden: building, paving, mountain making, planting, and writing.

“Inspiring Walt Disney: The Animation of French Decorative Arts”

This international traveling exhibition explored the early inspirations behind Disney Studios’ creations, particularly Walt Disney’s fascination with European art and the use of French motifs in Disney films and theme parks. Approximately 50 works of 18th-century European decorative art and design, many of which were drawn from The Huntington’s collection, were featured alongside hand-drawn production artworks and works on paper from the Walt Disney Animation Research Library, Walt Disney Archives, Walt Disney Imagineering Collection, and The Walt Disney Family Museum.

“The Hilton Als Series: Njideka Akunyili Crosby”

Njideka Akunyili Crosby (b. 1983) is a leading contemporary artist whose work offers critical perspectives on postcolonial history and experience as well as transnational identities. Born and raised in Nigeria, she came to the United States in 1999 to attend the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and Swarthmore College before obtaining a master’s degree in fine arts from Yale University. In 2017, she was awarded a MacArthur Fellowship. For this exhibition, Als and Akunyili Crosby selected collage-based paintings from “*The Beautiful Ones*”, the artist’s ongoing series of intimate portraits of Nigerian children, including members of her own family. The title references a classic 1968 novel, *The Beautiful Ones Are Not Yet Born*, by Ghanaian author Ayi Kwei Armah. Akunyili Crosby creates for her subjects unique settings in which history, philosophy, and fantasy permeate the walls of quiet living spaces.



“Printed in 1085: The Chinese Buddhist Canon from the Song Dynasty”
April 29–Dec. 4, 2023
Library, West Hall

This exhibition highlighted the connection between religion and China’s printmaking tradition, which had been practiced centuries before the first use of movable metal type in Europe. More than 900 years old, the *Scripture of the Great Flower Ornament of the Buddha* is part of the 5,850-volume *Great Canon of the Eternal Longevity of the Chongning Reign Period*. Produced during the Song dynasty (960–1279) between 1080 and 1112, the accordion-style book fully unfolds to a length of 31 feet. It is one of the longest sutras, or collections of aphorisms, in the Buddhist canon and is a compendium of doctrines and ritual practices widely followed throughout East Asia. Today, incomplete collections of the Chongning Canon volumes are scattered in libraries and private collections throughout Asia, Europe, and North America. Though the book was meant to be read by flipping from one page to the next, for this exhibition it was expanded in a custom case designed for maximum visibility, offering a rare opportunity to view the miraculously preserved relic.

The Library reached a broader and more diverse Reader community by adding six hours to its weekly schedule and adopting a more liberal access policy based on research need rather than credentials. The majority of Readers continue to be university faculty, doctorate holders, and Ph.D. candidates, but the Library also serves an increasing number of researchers with non-academic profiles. In addition, staff fielded more than 7,000 virtual and in-person reference queries and facilitated 240 hourlong virtual document consultations, as assisting researchers at a distance has become a growing commitment.

NOTABLE ACQUISITIONS

Loren Rothschild, former chair of the Board of Trustees, and his wife, Frances, donated their collection of autograph manuscripts and letters, annotated copies of published works, and other materials related to Sir Richard Francis Burton—the 19th-century British writer, traveler, and translator—and wife Isabel Burton.

Mónica C. Lozano, former editor and publisher of the largest Spanish-language newspaper in the United States, *La Opinión*, and a force in California business and politics, donated her papers.

Rounding Cape Horn by Carleton E. Watkins, part of a multipage album, was digitized, allowing visitors to explore the materials more closely. The Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens.

The Liljestrand Family Papers were donated by Shan McKinley Liljestrand. This major cache of correspondence, books, manuscripts, photographic material, and China-related ephemera was assembled by Dr. Sven Harry Liljestrand, a medical missionary in early 20th-century China, and his descendants.

Hilary Mantel's widower, Gerald McEwen, donated the final portion of his wife's papers, including drafts, diaries, and notebooks. The Huntington holds the renowned British novelist's complete archive.

Suzelle Smith and Don Howarth gave a collection of 557 watercolors by portrait artist Don Bachardy, the longtime partner of Christopher Isherwood, whose papers are at The Huntington.

Ethan and Joanne Lipsig made possible the purchase of an extra-illustrated set of John Ruskin's memoir *Praeterita*, which incorporates extensive original manuscript material, including correspondence with J. M. W. Turner, Dante Gabriel Rossetti, and Robert Browning.

DIGITIZATION

The Huntington Digital Library added important materials related to abolition and slavery. The Dickinson & Shrewsbury Records comprise 1,447 personal, business, and legal records of a West Virginia salt mine

company that employed enslaved labor, including the family of Booker T. Washington. In addition, the papers of Scottish abolitionist Zachary Macaulay—more than 1,000 items—were digitized. In the 1790s, Macaulay was governor of a colony established in Sierra Leone for freed slaves. Six volumes of the Stowe Papers were imaged for inclusion in *SlaveVoyages*, the world’s largest open-access repository on the trans-Atlantic and intra-American slave trades.

Other completed digitization projects included the Carleton E. Watkins mammoth plate photographs of views along the Central Pacific Railroad, Yosemite, and Mendocino Coast, California, and glass plate negatives and photographs from the Lisa See Collection that captured images of Los Angeles’ Chinatown and its residents in the 1890s–1900s. Also digitized were two botanical albums drawn by Mary Parker, Countess of Macclesfield, and her daughter, Lady Elizabeth Parker Fane, that depict plant specimens local to Shirburn Castle in Oxfordshire, 1756–1767. The 17 woodblock-printed books, ca. 1735–1820, that make up Jie zi yuan hua pu (芥子園畫譜, *The Mustard Seed Garden Manual of Painting*) expanded the Digital Library’s natural history content.

ACQUISITIONS, CATALOGING, AND METADATA SERVICES (ACME)

Archivists processed 48 collections, including the Leigh Family Papers, the Eve Babitz Papers, and the Philip D. Nathanson Collection of crime writer Kenneth Millar, better known by his pseudonym Ross Macdonald. Catalogers created online records for more than 10,200 books, bound manuscripts, and visual and electronic resources.

Creation of digital surrogates for rare multimedia materials continued. This included The Huntington Library’s Women’s Studies seminars, a trove of more than 75 audiocassettes recorded at The Huntington from 1984 to 1998. Seminar speakers addressed a wide range of topics, including Black women architects, the unwaged labor of women, and Japanese women writers. Of special note is a rare recording of Octavia E. Butler speaking on the topic of “Speculative Fiction” during the October 1989 seminar.

Native American and Indigenous Collections Report

A task force of Library curators produced a foundational report on the department’s extensive collections related to Native American and Indigenous peoples. The report includes descriptive surveys of Native American holdings in the American History, Western American History, Photography, California, and Hispanic collections, and it outlines special considerations for handling, describing, and providing access to these materials.

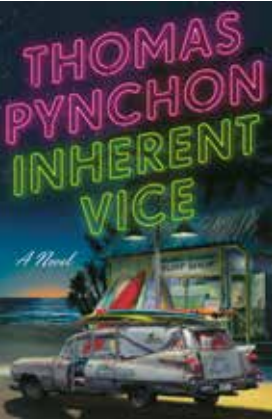

Thomas Pynchon Acquisition

The Huntington acquired the papers of Thomas Pynchon, considered to be one of the greatest living novelists. Comprising 70 linear feet of materials created between the late 1950s and the early 2020s, the archive includes typescripts and drafts of novels, handwritten notes, correspondence, and research.

The papers enhance The Huntington’s already distinguished collection of literary manuscript holdings from the 11th to the 21st century and resonate with the institution’s American historical, cartographic, mathematical, and aerospace collec-tions. The purchase was made possible by generous supporters, and the acquisition received significant press attention, including coverage in the New York Times and the Los Angeles Times.

Shapiro Book Prize

The 2023 Shapiro Book Prize was awarded to R. Isabela Morales for *Happy Dreams of Liberty: An American Family in Slavery and Freedom* (Oxford University Press, 2022). A committee of distinguished scholars selected Morales’ book from among more than 60 publisher-nominated works. Morales is a project manager for the Princeton & Slavery Project and an exhibition manager for the Stoutsburg Sourland African American Museum in Skillman, New Jersey.

The \$10,000 cash prize, jointly administered biennially by the Library and Research divisions, honors an outstanding first scholarly monograph in American history and culture. L. Dennis and Susan Shapiro made this prize possible as part of their 2019 endowment of the Shapiro Center for American History and Culture at The Huntington.

LIBRARY COLLECTORS’ COUNCIL

Among the stellar acquisitions by the LCC: a manuscript account of a trip by flatboat down the Mississippi River in 1810; a unique album of drawings that illustrate tobacco processing at what is believed to be the Royal Tobacco Factory in 1770s Seville, Spain; an extraordinary cryptic, microscopic manuscript-cum-drawing made for the Dauphine of France around 1683; and a lavishly illustrated treatise on the butterflies and moths of Georgia at the turn of the 19th century.

EXHIBITIONS

“The Hilton Als Series: Njideka Akunyili Crosby” opened in early spring in the Huntington Art Gallery. For this exhibition, Hilton Als, the Hannah and Russel Kully Distinguished Fellow in American Art, and Akunyili Crosby selected collage-based paintings from “*The Beautiful Ones*”, the artist’s ongoing series of intimate portraits of Nigerian children, including members of her own family. The title refers to the 1968 novel *The Beautiful Ones Are Not Yet Born*, by Ghanaian author Ayi Kwei Armah.

“Gee’s Bend: Shared Legacy” opened in the fall. The exhibition featured works by four quiltmakers from Gee’s Bend, Alabama, created in partnership with Paulson Fontaine Press in Berkeley, California. Working with printmakers there, quiltmakers Mary Lee Bendolph, Louisiana Bendolph, Loretta Bennett, and Loretta Pettway produced a series of 32 large-format prints, which were acquired by The Huntington’s Art Collectors’ Council in 2019. The exhibition explored the process of transferring the quilted designs to the printed medium. Twenty-four prints were displayed in two rotations of 12 each, along with two remarkable large quilts by Mary Lee Bendolph, *Diner* (2004) and *Image of Formal Presidents* (2009), which were acquired by the Art Collectors’ Council in 2021. The latter quilt was made to commemorate the inauguration of President Barack Obama.

INSTALLATIONS AND ACQUISITIONS

New installations in the Erburu Gallery highlighted acquisitions in 20th-century and contemporary art. Wall texts presented such new themes as “Liquid Nature,” exploring how artists depict nature, and “Pacific Crossings,” highlighting the importance of the Pacific Rim in American art, as reflected in the works of artists from Mineo Mizuno, Cai Guo-Qiang, and Dominique Fung to Robert Rauschenberg and Sam Francis. Major acquisitions include California painter Guy Rose’s impressionistic *Tamarisk Trees in Early Sunlight* (ca. 1899–1912), a gift of James Zidell; Japanese American artist Kenjiro Nomura’s watery image of the Seattle waterfront, *Puget Sound* (1947), a gift of Robert Hori; and Chinese Canadian painter Dominique Fung’s *Sans Les Mains* (2022), an ingenious take on Édouard Manet’s *Le Déjeuner sur l’herbe*, purchased with funds from Dominic and Ellen Ng.

The especially intriguing artwork *Landscape Impressions* (2008) was on loan from the collection of Jeffrey Deitch. This major work by the Chinese-born American artist Cai Guo-Qiang is an impressionistic landscape painted on a four-panel screen with a mixture of pigment and gunpowder that the artist ignited. The effect is a “drawing” that is at once spontaneous and controlled. The image is rooted in both Chinese and Western painting traditions while evoking the history of gunpowder and political events in Chinese society. This piece was part of an installation that included Mineo Mizuno’s *Teardrop with Calligraphy “Zero”* (2010), highlighting the importance of the Pacific Rim and trans-Pacific connections in the development of global modernism.



Vigée Le Brun Acquisition

The acquisition of *Portrait of Joseph Hyacinthe François-de-Paule de Rigaud, comte de Vaudreuil* (ca. 1784) by Élisabeth Louise Vigée Le Brun (1755–1842), the most important female artist of 18th-century France, amplified The Huntington’s French painting collection while also building on its collection of 18th-century French decorative arts, one of the Art Museum’s signature strengths.

Significant acquisitions of the fiscal period included Mizuno’s *Thousand Blossoms* (2020), a work composed of 3,000 handmade ceramic dogwood blossoms stacked into a tightly composed rectangle. As a gesture of poetic disruption, the corner of the rigid stack seems to collapse, and a few blossoms scatter on the floor. Mizuno’s choice of dogwood flowers refers to his own past and present environments: Dogwood trees bloom in Japan, where Mizuno was born, and in California near the Sierra Nevada, where he maintains his studio. *Thousand Blossoms* activates two 19th-century terra-cotta figures in the hallway—replicas of marble sculptures made in 1709 representing a tree nymph and Flora, the ancient Roman goddess of flowering plants. Mizuno’s artistic practice combines technical mastery of the ceramic medium with humanist meditations on the natural world and life cycles.

A new acquisition on view in the Virginia Steele Scott Galleries of American Art is Nari Ward’s *Anchoring Escapement: Baule* (2018). Ward’s work, an assemblage sculpture based on an 18th-century tall case clock, creates thought-provoking juxtapositions that interrogate aspects of American history, technology, and slavery.

The Huntington received a major gift of 22 works from Jonathan and Karin Fielding. These include paintings, textiles, furniture, and works on paper dating to the 18th and 19th centuries. Among the highlights are portraits: a 1784 oil painting of a young boy with a dog by the artist known as the Gloucester Limner, a portrait of a young girl and boy (ca. 1845) by the renowned artist William Matthew Prior, a delicate pastel by James Martin, and a set of pendant oil portraits of a young couple with trees. Textiles include a large floral hooked rug (1786) by Martha Bradley and samplers (1805) by Eliza Clapp. Many of these artworks will be displayed in the future as the rotation of light-sensitive works in the Fielding Wing continues.

To be the best stewards of The Huntington’s growing collection, Art Museum staff conducted rigorous analyses of current spaces and processes. In collaboration with colleagues from across the institution, the Art Museum made strides in long-term collection management—including how to best expand holdings in American, Asian, and European art—and crafted an ambitious and sustainable five-year exhibition program.

ART COLLECTORS’ COUNCIL

The Art Collectors’ Council brought six new works into The Huntington’s collections. Their composition dates range from the 18th to the 21st century, and they represent an array of media, from oil painting on canvas and mixed-metal silverwork to photographic portraits on textiles and oil and charcoal on plywood. These acquisitions also represent a diversity of artists—two are women, two are African American, and one is Asian American—thus furthering the strategic goal of broadening the range and depth of the American art collection. The artists’ birthplaces—England, Canada, China, and Italy—tell a compelling story of émigré artists who worked in the United States and, in one case, the colonial British West Indies.

Hannah and Russel Kully Distinguished Fellow in American Art

The Huntington named Pulitzer Prize–winning critic and curator Hilton Als as the inaugural Hannah and Russel Kully Distinguished Fellow in American Art. After meeting with curators from across The Huntington’s three collections, he began work on a future exhibition featuring works from the Art and Library collections.

David Hockney Acquisition

The Huntington acquired its first oil painting by David Hockney, *Tree on Woldgate, 6 March* (2006). The painting was installed on the second floor of the Huntington Art Gallery near John Constable’s iconic landscape painting *View on the Stour Near Dedham* (1822), a nod to the inspiration of British masterpieces on this renowned living artist.

preservation & conservation

In 2020, The Huntington began participating in the Getty Post-Baccalaureate Conservation Internship program, which promotes diversity by increasing the number of students from underrepresented backgrounds enrolled in graduate degree programs related to museum conservation. In the summer of 2023, the Preservation and Conservation department welcomed its first intern, Cindy Moreno, a UCLA graduate in art history. Moreno spent three months in The Huntington's conservation lab working on book and paper conservation. Her efforts contributed to preparations for the 2024 exhibitions "Albrecht Dürer: Wanderlust" and "PST ART: *Art & Science Collide*."

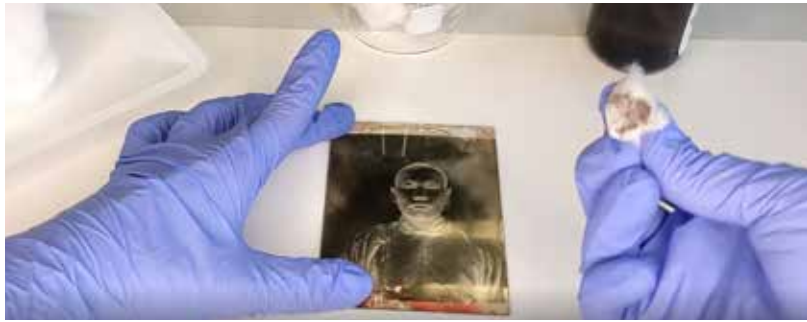
Conservation laboratory staff supported digitization projects, prepared items for exhibitions and loans, and completed collections care. Although there was little difference between the number of collection items treated last year and this year, the greater complexity of this year's efforts resulted in a 30% increase in the total number of hours spent on treatments. For example, the process of preparing a 15th-century block book for digitization was particularly time-consuming because the conservators had to work carefully under a microscope in order to stabilize tiny areas of pigment.

PREPARING THE KITTO BIBLE FOR LOAN

Conservators completed treatment on two volumes of the extra-illustrated Kitto Bible in preparation for its loan to the Städel Museum in Frankfurt, Germany. Extra-illustration refers to the once-popular practice of carefully inserting prints, manuscripts, or other illustrative material into a copy of a book. In this case, a two-volume Bible was expanded to 60 volumes with more than 30,000 prints, drawings, and other inserted materials. The publication date of the original Bible remains unclear, but the addition of extra materials began around 1795 and continued through 1836.

The Städel Museum requested volumes 38 and 50 because they contain original drawings by Hans Holbein the Elder for the high altar of the Dominican Church in Frankfurt. Each volume of the Kitto Bible measures nearly 2 feet by about 16 inches and weighs close to 30 pounds. In such heavy volumes, the weight of the paper stresses the joints where the front and back cover boards meet the spine. Volume 38 had completely broken and had to be repaired in preparation for the loan. A Preservation staff courier ensured the volumes' safe arrival at the Städel Museum and assisted with the installation using custom acrylic cradles designed by Huntington staff.



DIGITIZING BLOCK BOOKS

20 Block books, printed on paper entirely from wooden blocks incised with text or text and illustrations on the same surface, predate books printed with moveable type, whose text and images are generally printed from separate plates. The exact age of block books remains uncertain, but scholars believe they were likely printed during the 1460s and 1470s.

For the digitization of *The Apocalypse of Saint John*, conservators, peering in turn through a microscope for many hours, stabilized powdery pigment and lifted glazed areas from the pages. One hand-colored volume proved to be too tightly bound for conservators to open, so the team worked with Imaging Services and used special equipment to complete the book’s digitization without damaging it.

Photographic services staff digitized 11 block books, and the project was presented as part of the J. Paul Getty Museum and Getty Foundation’s Color on Paper, a professional development workshop for curators and conservators.

CASED PHOTOGRAPHS DIGITIZATION PROJECT

Conservators cleaned and rehoused some of the earliest photographic collections at The Huntington—known as “cased photographs”—including daguerreotypes, ambrotypes, and tintypes. To support these fragile items while they were being digitized, staff repurposed special mounts that had been previously created to image miniature books.

PREPARING CHARLES WHITE’S *SOLDIER* FOR EXHIBITION

Artist Charles White’s painting *Soldier* was prepared for transport and display as part of the multivenue exhibition “Art for the People: WPA-Era Paintings from the Dijkstra Collection.” White created the image using a traditional egg tempera technique on an unconventional support: Masonite. The edges of the piece were damaged and required repair so that it could be safely handled, transported in a microclimate frame, and displayed.

DIGITIZING PHOTOGRAPHS OF OLD CHINATOWN

Preparing the Lisa See Collection of Old Chinatown photographs for digitization posed several challenges. Of the more than 100 fragile glass plate negatives, some had water damage, some were broken, and all required extensive cleaning with a deionized water and ethanol solution. All the negatives in the collection can now be easily handled during digitization and storage.

PROJECTS

Throughout the year, the Botanical Gardens and grounds underwent significant improvements. Among the highly visible accomplishments were completed renovations to the Rose Garden Tea Room along with adjacent paths and plantings, upgrades to the Desert Garden, and progress on the Japanese Heritage Shōya House and garden area. Behind-the-scenes achievements included important strides in ongoing research projects, productive collaborations that furthered institutional goals in conservation and sustainability, and expanded access to the collections for colleagues and the public, thanks to physical improvements on the grounds as well as ongoing work in mapping and cataloging.

Japanese Heritage Shōya House

The reinstallation of the Shōya House’s residential-style garden—which was situated in front of the house in its original Marugame, Japan, location—began in earnest with the arrival of six landscape designers and technicians from Japan. Their task was to replicate the Edo period (1603–1867) garden using the stones, rockery, and other outdoor features that had been transported with the house to San Marino. The courtyard garden features more than 820 stones collected by the Yokoi family—the original owners of the property—over the centuries from neighboring islands around the Seto Inland Sea. Designed to be viewed from the formal reception room inside the house, the miniature landscape includes a dry waterfall, koi pond, stone bridge, stone lanterns, and hand-washing basins. The complete house and garden was scheduled to open in fall 2023.

Desert Garden

Work on the new, more accessible pathway continued apace. At the start of the fiscal period, all the plants were carefully moved out of the Desert Garden Conservatory, allowing for structural work to begin on the greenhouse. This is the first time since the conservatory was built in 1985 that all the plants had been removed.

In November 2022, the renovation of offices and public spaces in the Frances Lasker Brody Botanical Center began. This project provided an opportunity to better align physical spaces with their functions. Thomas Polansky, vice president for operations and facilities, relocated to an office in the Botanical Center, a move focused on promoting collaborative efforts to renew capital assets and address environmental challenges through institutional sustainability initiatives.

COLLECTIONS

Endeavors to expand the collections’ impact at local, domestic, and global levels included increasing the number of living collections with wild provenance, deepening genetic representation in select core collections, and sharing unique plants with other institutions to reduce the likelihood that they would be lost in cultivation. During the fiscal period, seeds from several rare plant species in the tropical collections were distributed to botanical gardens across the country.

In the winter, more than a dozen powerful storms in rapid succession delivered more than 40 inches of rain to the gardens. (The average rainfall was just 4 inches during the same period over the past three seasons.) While the storms brought some drought relief, they forced the closure of the gardens for safety reasons, led to oversaturated soil, and resulted in the loss of 35 trees, including 11 mature coast live oaks.

Gary Roberson, lead project gardener of the cycad and palm collections, pollinated two critically endangered cycads from South Africa: *Encephalartos latifrons* and *E. middelburgensis*. Producing new plants from controlled pollination is one way that The Huntington’s remarkable cycad collection contributes to the global conservation of this plant group. Plants from prior pollination efforts were sold at the Spring Plant Sale.

Multiple plant thefts prompted the establishment of an institutionwide action plan, which included an analysis of existing security infrastructure and staffing levels. Collection security remains a top priority. By emphasizing the importance of The Huntington’s living collections, staff, volunteers, and visitors are all encouraged to play a role in protecting these plants.

COLLABORATIONS

22 With the goal of sharing knowledge to help safeguard rare and endangered species, The Huntington continued to host botanical researchers from other institutions in the recently completed Crotty Conservation Laboratory. Raquel Folgado, cryopreservation botanist, and Brian Dorsey, senior systematic and conservation botanist, continued to mentor others while advancing their research programs.

After a pandemic-related hiatus of several years, teacher training in biotechnology resumed in The Huntington’s Engemann Applied Tech Lab. This program—offered through Amgen and the LA Promise Fund—empowers teachers to bring biotechnology to their classrooms.

In November 2022, Nicole Cavender, Telleen/Jorgensen Director of the Botanical Gardens, traveled to Japan to take part in the Green Legacy Hiroshima Initiative. She was joined by a delegation of representatives from the San Diego Botanic Garden, the Salk Institute for Biological Studies, and the Denver Botanic Gardens. Hosted by the United Nations Institute for Training and Research, the working group is part of a peace initiative for studying trees that survived the explosion of the atom bomb. Cavender also traveled to Kyoto to meet with Hanatoyo Landscape Co. and Nakamura Sotoji Komuten, with whom The Huntington collaborated on the Japanese Heritage Shōya House.

In September, Cavender and Sean Lahmeyer, plant collections and conservation manager, served as delegates for the Botanic Gardens Conservation International’s seventh annual Global Botanic Gardens Congress in Melbourne, Australia. Their presentation highlighted the role of The Huntington’s living plant collections on the global stage, the conservation programs built around the collections, and how institutions such as The Huntington can serve as agents of change.

For the eighth annual California Oak Symposium (Oct. 31–Nov. 3, 2022, in San Luis Obispo, California), Cavender; Lahmeyer; Tim Thibault, curator of woody plant materials; and James Brumder, associate director of garden operations, developed a presentation about protecting wild Engelmann oaks (*Quercus engelmannii*).

In May, Folgado, Lahmeyer, and Thibault attended the 40th annual Center for Plant Conservation (CPC) conference, held at the Desert

Botanical Garden in Phoenix. As a CPC partner, The Huntington works with nine institutions on projects focused on fieldwork and protocol development in cryobiotechnology. These types of partnerships underscore the value of institutional collaboration and shared resources.

Dorsey, Thibault, and partners including Morton Arboretum’s tree conservation biologist Sean Hoban received an Institute of Museum and Library Services grant that supports a collaborative effort to assess the frequency of unintentional hybridization in garden settings. This phenomenon threatens the genetic integrity of living collections.

The discovery of a tropical slug (*Veronicella cubensis*) in The Rose Hills Foundation Conservatory for Botanical Science in January 2023 led the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) to close the facility and impose quarantines on surrounding areas. Botanical staff organized a roundtable discussion about slug management and remediation strategies for CDFA representatives. Because state and county agencies have no established protocols to deal with this potentially invasive pest, Huntington staff consulted with experts Ken Hayes and Norine Yeung from the Bishop Museum in Hawai’i to establish methods for detection and identification, as well as to develop protocols for the eradication of the slug. Jann Vendetti, associate curator of malacology at the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County, also participated. The results of these discussions will be shared with governmental agencies and other botanical gardens and growers.

RESEARCH

Dorsey and Thibault continued fieldwork focused on collecting *Fraxinus* (Ash) seed from California, New Mexico, Utah, and Washington. In

The Rose Garden Tea Room Reopens

The Rose Garden Tea Room reopened to the public on May 24, 2023. The iconic Huntington destination closed in March 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic, and then it underwent a major 18-month renovation. The \$11.2 million project broke ground in late 2021 and was funded entirely through philanthropic gifts. In addition to improved functionality in service areas, the front of the original 1911 building was restored and two new spaces—the Herb Room Terrace and the Shakespeare Pavilion—offer outdoor dining experiences surrounded by the gardens. The re-imagined landscaping is grounded in principles of sustainability while preserving the familiar ambience that has appealed to visitors for more than a century.

Asian American Experiences in California: Past, Present, Future

In March, the Center for East Asian Garden Studies and the Research division brought together scholars, writers, and activists to discuss the past, present, and future of Asian diasporic and Asian American communities in California. The symposium explored ways that The Huntington’s collections can continue to activate and preserve this history to serve our community. Nearly 300 people attended the event, which was organized by a cross-institutional committee comprising staff from Advancement, Art, Botanical, Library, and the President’s Office. There also was a complementary Huntington U course on the institution’s Asian American collections and a Family Day event. Support for the symposium came from the Sammy Yukuan Lee Foundation and the Justin Vajna Memorial Fund for Educational Programs in the Chinese Garden.

the summer of 2022, the emerald ash borer (*Agrilus planipennis*) was documented in Oregon, the first case on the West Coast, underscoring the importance of ongoing efforts to find tree genotypes that may be resistant to this pest insect. Thibault also scouted and collected acorns, including *Quercus cedrosensis* from San Diego County, for tissue culture research. He collaborated with staff from other botanical gardens to collect the acorns of *Q. welshii* from Arizona and Utah, and he led collaborative fieldwork with the San Diego Botanic Garden, the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum, and Morton Arboretum. A new population of *Q. palmeri* was discovered in Arizona during this trip.

The Huntington hosted a meeting of the California Avocado Society and offered a tour of the Crotty Conservation Laboratory. The Huntington continues to support research that safeguards the genetic resources of avocado, partnering with colleagues in the United States, Mexico, Spain, and Australia. In April, conservation technician Josette Tin presented on the micropropagation of avocados (*Persea* spp.) in California at the 10th World Avocado Congress in Auckland, New Zealand.

WATER UPDATE

In May, garden staff participated in a hands-on workshop—led by Tom Rau, senior vice president of Urban Water Group Inc.—regarding water capture in the landscape. Participants learned how to calculate water capture rates from such impermeable surfaces as roofs and how to determine layout and construction parameters for developing swales and rain gardens. The workshop was hosted at the Botanical Gardens director’s on-site residence, where swales are being constructed to capture rainwater.

CENTER FOR EAST ASIAN GARDEN STUDIES (CEAGS)

The process of cataloging the CEAGS research collection has been completed after two years. The 8,000 titles, now accessible through the

Huntington Library’s main catalog, consist of modern (post-1930) academic books in English, Chinese, and Japanese on Chinese history, art history, garden history, and literature, as well as Japanese garden history.

Public Programs

Oct. 30, 2022: Composer Nathan Wang, the 2022–23 Cheng Family Foundation Visiting Artist in the Chinese Garden, offered a preview of songs from his new musical, *Shanghai’s World Emporium*. A workshop of the full musical took place on May 20 and 21, 2023, as the culmination of Wang’s residency.

Nov. 5, 2022: Director Wei Zhao-yi and composer Chou Hsuan-hung presented their film *Whispers of Trees* with live musical accompaniment. The film uses the perspective of trees to provide a new view of the environment, human activity, and the rhythms of daily life.

There continued to be weekly music performances in the Chinese Garden, featuring three traditional Chinese instruments. During the performances, the Flowery Brush Library welcomed visitors, who could try writing with a brush, strumming a *qin* (a type of zither), and playing the game *weiqi*.

INTERNS

Interns gain hands-on experience working with The Huntington’s living collections and assisting staff members with large-scale projects. Summer intern Audrey Ellias assisted with record-keeping, pollination, and repotting of the tropical cycad collection. Other collections-based interns included Halle Sunabe (orchid collections) and Annica Wu (nursery technician). In early April, two interns, Adeline Xiong and Amaris Sandoval, began assisting The Huntington’s orchid specialist, plant recorder, and GIS mapping specialist. In early June, Kelly Kwok and Avery Fratto from the USC Dornsife Career Pathways program assisted with infrastructure and plant mapping projects using GIS software. Alex Buangsuwon and Savanna Kelly began work in the Experiential and Teaching Gardens with a focus on growing edible plants. Laboratory intern Tomas Fanning focused on refining tissue culture techniques for woody plants, and Sydney Kaye collected tissue and DNA samples from living collections for the Global Genome Biodiversity Network. Desert Collections intern Bridget Lee helped repot a major portion of the epiphytic cactus collection.

BOTANICAL SYMPOSIA, WORKSHOPS, SALES, AND PUBLIC PROGRAMS

The 39th annual Succulent Plants Symposium featured five speakers on a range of topics. Notable presenters included Jared Margulies from the University of Alabama on the psychology behind plant poaching and Olwen Grace from the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, on how collections such as The Huntington’s can contribute to plant conservation on a global scale.

The Western Tree Management Symposium, presented by Street Tree Seminar Inc., addressed “Creative Approaches to Managing Trees in a Changing Environment.”

In October, the sixth annual International Orchid Show and Sale drew a record number of exhibitors from local societies across the Southern California region. It also attracted many new vendors, including international nurseries.

In December, Aiseki Kai’s 33rd annual Viewing Stones Show took place, drawing large numbers of holiday visitors.

In February, The Huntington hosted the 49th annual Camellia Show, co-sponsored by the Southern California Camellia Society. In conjunction with this event, The Huntington’s camellia collection was renewed as a garden of excellence by the International Camellia Society.

During the annual Bonsai-a-Thon in February, Southern California bonsai masters shared their passion for the art form with demonstrations, prize drawings, an auction, and a bazaar.

In April, Stephen Blackmore, chair of the Botanic Gardens Conservation International board and His Majesty’s Botanist in Scotland, spoke on the power and impact of the global network of botanical gardens, highlighting The Huntington’s significant role.

Second Thursday Garden Talks: This series of presentations geared toward local gardeners covered many topics, including tips for selecting climate-ready trees and how a nonprofit foundation helps rehabilitate people with mental health issues through horticulture. In May, garden designer Ivette Soler gave a presentation on the creative process behind the renovated Rose Garden Tea Room landscaping.

In April, the 48th annual Spring Plant Sale had one of the largest turnouts in recent history and raised more than \$263,000.



Leadership in Water Conservation

The Huntington assumed a leadership role on behalf of California public gardens to ensure their future in times of extreme drought. With support from the Board of Trustees and Ethan Lipsig, a member of the Board of Governors, and following a series of careful interviews, The Huntington hired a lobbying and consulting firm, the Gualco Group, to advocate at the state Capitol on behalf of botanical gardens and their landscape water use. Plans are now being developed for water capture and improved water efficiency across The Huntington.

Following the departure of W.M. Keck Foundation Director of Research Steve Hindle, Natalia Molina, distinguished professor of American studies and ethnicity at USC and a member of The Huntington's Board of Governors, became the interim director. A MacArthur Fellow and the author of *A Place at the Nayarit: How a Mexican Restaurant Nourished a Community* (University of California Press, 2022) and several other acclaimed works, Molina temporarily stepped down from the board in order to serve in the interim role.

After an international search, The Huntington announced the appointment of University of Michigan history professor Susan Juster as director of research. Juster, the recipient of a 2020 Guggenheim fellowship, served as the Rhys Isaac Collegiate Professor of History at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. She joined The Huntington staff in early 2023. Juster's research as a scholar of 17th- and 18th-century American history focuses on religion in the early Atlantic world, primarily looking at Protestant and Catholic communities in early America. Her most recent project explored the role of women, enslaved people, and Native Americans, along with English and Irish settlers, in creating Catholic communities in English America.

With the goal of magnifying The Huntington's reach and impact, the Research division and the Art Museum partnered with Trinity College

in Cambridge, England, to create the Berger Trust Future Leaders Fellowship in the History of British Art, a joint fellowship with generous support from the Berger Trust. In addition, a new two-year postdoctoral position in the history of medicine was created in partnership with the Cedars-Sinai Medical Center; the first postdoctoral fellow will be appointed in September 2024.

The Huntington-USC Institute on California and the West (ICW) expanded collaborative work on the history and culture of the American West. In addition to such core projects as the Chinatown History Project and The West on Fire, initiatives included a new website, a third season of the Western Edition podcast, and participation in The Huntington’s Founders’ Day programming.

ICW welcomed USC professor Natalia Molina as a co-creator of the ongoing “Third LA” project and hosted two events. “Eating, Drinking, and Working in LA” was a moderated webinar discussion between Molina and entrepreneur Cedd Moses. “The Hardware of Inequality” addressed public space by way of the rise and fall of the public restroom, featuring Temple University historian Bryant Simon, Evan Madden of the Portland Loos, and social services provider Kerry Morrison of Heart Forward LA.

ICW focused on cultural and environmental histories, from virtual series *Peril: Drought, Climate Change, and the American West* and *Pacific Histories of the West* to the online conversation “‘Someday it will be legal ...’: Historical Relevance Post-Dobbs.” In partnership with the Forest History Society, ICW hosted two webinars: “Folklore and the Forest” and “Shell-Shocked and Irradiated: Managing Ukraine’s Forests in Time of War.”

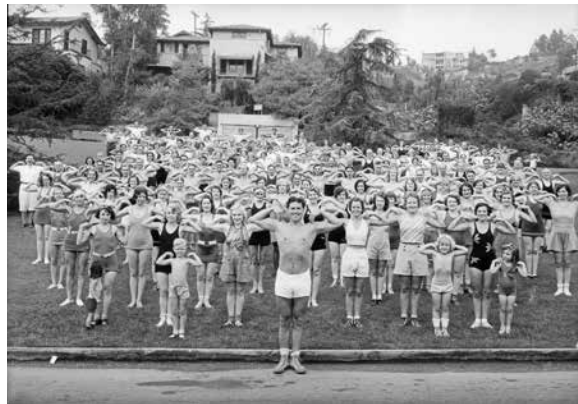

Standalone events rounded out the year. Historian Richard White joined ICW director William Deverell in conversation about White’s most recent work, *Who Killed Jane Stanford?: A Gilded Age Tale of Murder, Deceit, Spirits, and the Birth of a University* (W. W. Norton & Co., 2022). Natalia Molina hosted Mike Amezcua at The Huntington to discuss his new book, *Making Mexican Chicago: From Postwar Settlement to the Age of Gentrification* (University of Chicago Press, 2022). Historian Wade Graham joined Los Angeles County Fire Department chiefs Drew Smith and Ron Durbin in conversation for “Managing Wildfires in Los Angeles County.”

In October, ICW hosted USC graduate students studying the American West, chief historian of the U.S. Forest Service Lincoln Bramwell, Smithsonian curator Margaret Salazar-Porzio, and Ninth Circuit Judge and historian M. Margaret McKeown at the Murie Ranch in Grand Teton National Park. This opportunity to delve into the role of history outside academia, explore nature, and work on their own projects deepened the students’ commitment to their studies.

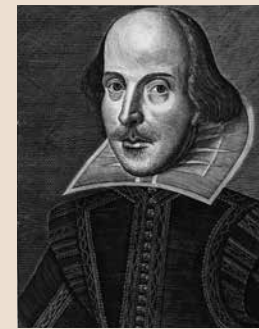
In January, ICW celebrated the award of a National Endowment for the Humanities grant to continue its Chinatown History Project, an augmented reality prototype made in partnership with The Huntington, Los Angeles Metro, and the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California.

After spending the year focused on issues of civic engagement, ICW’s Los Angeles Service Academy (LASA) graduated its 10th class of high school juniors from across the county. From picking oranges in The Huntington’s Ranch Garden for the Hollywood Food Coalition to joining curators Li Wei Yang and Stephen Tabor for a discussion of their roles as caretakers of archival material, LASA students drew on a wide range of what The Huntington offers. New focus areas included the role that firefighters play in their community and water recycling with visits to the Beverly Hills Fire Department and the Pure Water site in Carson. Continuing its yearly practice, LASA supported original student research on food insecurity in LA.

The Research Institute for the History of Science and Technology (RIHST) at Caltech and The Huntington welcomed Dmitri Levitin, research fellow from All Souls College at Oxford University. Levitin is among the foremost scholars working on early modern

science, in particular on Newton and related matters. In the spring, Anthony Grafton, 2021–22 RIHST senior fellow, convened the conference “History in Science: Cases and Comparison,” which brought together scholars—including Levitin—from different generations and with complementary interests to reflect on the ways that scientists have tried to use data to shape visions of the past to fit their needs.

The USC-Huntington Early Modern Studies Institute (EMSI) hosted regular meetings of its seminar and music series while maintaining support for academic research through faculty and graduate student fellowships. It continued to co-sponsor the Early Modern Americas series with the University of Pennsylvania Press and provide collaborative programming with the *William and Mary Quarterly*, the University of Toronto, the University of Birmingham, the Autry Museum of the American West, the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales, and the University of Chicago. The Huntington hosted regular meetings with USC throughout the year. Multiple performances and lectures took place at USC as part of the Early Music Series. 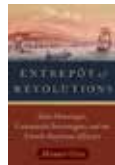

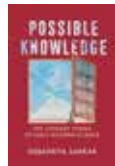

Prize for British Art History. The 2022 exhibition catalog by curator Melinda McCurdy showcases 100 stunning works from The Huntington’s collection of more than 12,000 drawings and watercolors by British artists from the 17th to the mid-20th century.

Huntington Library Quarterly

The *Huntington Library Quarterly* (HLQ) produced two special issues: vol. 85, no. 1, “Performance and the Paper Stage, 1640–1700,” and vol. 85, no. 4, “Histories of the Premodern Poetry Miscellany.” Both were guest-edited by external scholars and lauded by peer reviewers for being “important and timely” interventions into scholarly debates about the relationship between pre- and post-interregnum drama (85.1) and the idea of the poetic miscellany (85.4), a unique early modern literary genre that was often perceived as disorderly and even chaotic because it violated the norm of individual authorship.

Huntington Library Quarterly, vol. 85, no. 2, included a memorial to Richard H. Rouse, a longtime reader who was instrumental in researching the comprehensive Guides to the Library’s various manuscript holdings. The issue also contains James Simpson’s essay “The Ellesmere Chaucer: The Once and Future *Canterbury Tales*,” the Centennial Crotty Lecture that was canceled in 2020 because of the pandemic. Submissions and peer review for the journal moved to the Scholastica platform as of Dec. 1, 2022.

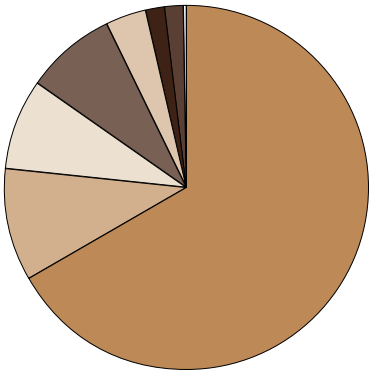
Huntington Library Quarterly, vol. 85, no. 3, included an essay on 18th-century British Quakers’ debates over smallpox inoculation, highlighting Enlightenment-era conflicts between religious and scientific views of disease—an example of how scholarship promoted by The Huntington helps to contextualize contemporary challenges, a key aim of the institution’s strategic plan.

INCLUSION AND ACCESSIBILITY

Continued implementation of the institution’s DEI Strategic Plan has led to greater representation of scholars of color on the Research program’s peer review committees. We are committed to building a diverse pipeline of applicants and to expanding access to our fellowship programs for independent and nontraditional scholars. This approach is yielding encouraging outcomes, and the percentage of awardees who are scholars of color has increased significantly. In the 2022–23 cohort, scholars of color made up 27% of short-term fellowship awardees, 38% of long-term fellowship awardees, and 21% of travel grant recipients.

Fellowship Demographics for the 2022–23 Academic Year

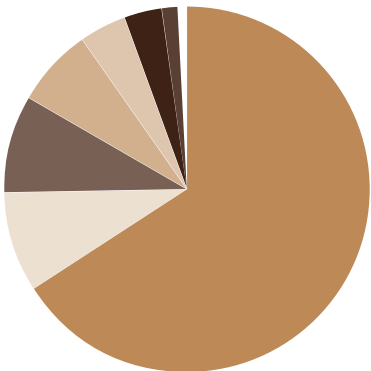

A total of 141 grantees received long- or short-term fellowships and travel grants; six individuals chose multiple categories, resulting in 147 selections.

Through formal programs for educators, students, and lifelong learners as well as informal interactions in the gardens and galleries, The Huntington promotes active use of and connection to Huntington collections and exhibitions. During the fiscal period, Education staff developed new points of access through tours for school and public audiences, online learning resources, and enhanced visitor experiences. Drop-in programs highlighted key exhibitions and new acquisitions. Family Day became a monthly opportunity for families to explore The Huntington in a fun and festive atmosphere. At new spotlight tours, docents highlighted American and European art. The division also supported ongoing efforts to capture data about visitor experiences through exit surveys and the evaluation of exhibitions and programming.

PROGRAMS FOR FAMILIES AND CHILDREN

Education staff hosted two full sessions of the summertime Explorers Camp in June and August. Re-imagined as a series of weeklong workshops, Explorers Camp included opportunities for children ages 5–13 to connect with Huntington collections by creating art, meeting curators, exploring the gardens, and sharing their work. Half-day sessions focused on such themes as Color Quest, Eco-Inventions, and the Photo Collective. Family Fridays: Movie Nights returned in the fall with two offerings, *Encanto* and *Raya and the Last Dragon*. In April, thanks to the generous sponsorship of the Kathleen Peck Fund for Victorian Studies, families

explored the fern craze of the Victorian era, created artwork inspired by William Morris prints, and learned about Victorian country dances on the East Lawn.

PROGRAMS FOR ADULTS

Adult classes and workshops connect Huntington collections with contemporary interests and issues. The range of offerings highlighted core elements of our mission—to foster learning, inspire creativity, and offer transformative experiences to diverse audiences. Top sellers included art history lectures and virtual classes on the fundamentals of watercolor as well as flower arranging. The Restore + Explore series offered popular programs—including mindfulness meditation, forest bathing, and tai chi—to connect people with nature and promote a sense of peace and relaxation.

EXPANDING ACCESS—FAMILY AND COMMUNITY

Community Partner programs are uniquely designed based on the needs and interests of the organizations involved. More than two dozen partnerships support the greater goal of expanding reduced-cost

Asian American Experiences Symposium and Family Day

The Huntington’s ever-deepening Asian and Pacific Rim collections include archival materials and artworks that document the lives of people of Chinese and Japanese heritage in Southern California. In the spirit of “One Huntington,” a cross-institutional team organized a symposium and Family Day that brought together scholars, community leaders, and other interested parties to reflect on the experiences of Asian and Asian American communities. In addition to scholarly presentations, the seminar series Huntington U offered attendees the opportunity to delve more deeply into Asian American history and The Huntington’s collections in this area. The Family Day events included hands-on activities from the Chinese American Museum; stories read aloud by teen volunteers in Mandarin, Japanese, Cantonese, and Korean; origami; performances featuring Indian dance styles; and musical performances composed by Nathan Wang, the 2022–23 Cheng Family Foundation Visiting Artist in the Chinese Garden.

opportunities to visit The Huntington. The Education division distributes free admission passes to participants and provides transportation support to partner families. Among the groups hosted during the fiscal period were international-language students from Pasadena City College; the community orchestra of Heart of Los Angeles; pediatric cancer nonprofit Pablove; and Families Forward Learning Center, an organization supporting low-income families. The Huntington also hosted a special pop-up event with the Pasadena Public Library to celebrate writer Octavia E. Butler and a sound-themed tour of the gardens with Youth Orchestra Los Angeles.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS AND PARTNERSHIPS

The long-term goal of school programs and partnerships is to expand access and reach up to 45,000 students annually by 2027. As of June 2023, 15,994 students participated in 278 Huntington school programs and 11 partnership programs—roughly 36% of this goal. Teacher-led on-site and virtual programs are part of the strategy to increase opportunities for students and teachers from more schools in the coming years. Docent-led visits continue to play a vital role, and because of that, increasing the number of docents available on a regular basis will be essential to maintain this high-quality visitor experience.

TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In the fall, The Huntington hosted more than 200 Los Angeles Unified School District Early Education Center principals, staff, and office managers, who learned about education programs and resources. New

programs Evening for Educators and Educator Open House focused on the “Inspiring Walt Disney” and “Njideka Akunyili Crosby” exhibitions. These programs offered opportunities for teachers to explore the exhibitions, learn more about the artists, and leave with activities and resources to use in their classrooms.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS

Mindful of the important role that adult volunteers and docents play in providing a high-quality visitor experience, The Huntington celebrated new and returning docents in the fall. Docents for American, European, and school programs completed their training in late August, and new “Ask Me” docents started training sessions in September. In the fall, new docent courses began for the Japanese Garden, Library Exhibition Hall, and Rose Garden. Docents were instrumental in redesigning botanical content for school programs. High school volunteers interacted with more than 5,000 visitors, primarily through the Art and Discovery carts placed strategically across campus. They also participated in training and program development by making presentations, conducting their own research, and analyzing visitor participation data.

Ghetto Film School Partnership

Ghetto Film School (GFS), in collaboration with The Huntington, launched its third series of films in the Virginia Steele Scott Galleries of American Art in late 2022. The series, titled “Nuestro Pueblo” (Our Town), took its inspiration from the “Borderlands” exhibition that has been on view in the Scott Galleries since 2021. “Nuestro Pueblo” refers to the Indigenous, Californio, and Spanish settlements that gave Los Angeles its name: “El Pueblo de Nuestra Señora la Reina de los Ángeles,” or “The Town of Our Lady the Queen of the Angels.” The series focused on the importance of preserving and documenting the diverse and complex cultural fabric of Los Angeles. The short films—an important showcase for young artists who provide new perspectives on Huntington collections—can be viewed at huntington.org/ghetto-film-school-huntington-partnership.

New “Plant Needs” Program

Education and Botanical staff teamed up with garden docents to revive key programs for the expanded Experiential and Teaching Gardens. Building on such past successes as “Seed to Table,” the newly designed “Plant Needs” program is an opportunity for a larger swath of students to explore The Huntington’s Kitchen Garden, Ranch Garden, and Orchard and discover how plants interact with the environment. The program’s scientific activities encourage students to observe, hypothesize, and investigate, emphasizing both native plants and food plants.

DEI & our staff

The Huntington demonstrated its continuing commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) with accomplishments across the institution. As clearly demonstrated throughout this Annual Report, DEI is a central aspect of Huntington culture and commitment, in both internal and external manifestations—from the exhibitions that are mounted and the objects that are acquired to hiring practices, programming, outreach, and beyond. This section provides updates on internal DEI initiatives not otherwise documented.

STAFF, VOLUNTEERS, AND LEADERSHIP

Human Resources (HR) implemented best practices for hiring and training while continuing to expand recruitment platforms and establish protocols to diversify job applicant pools.

Monique L. Thomas was hired as the DEI manager, overseeing the DEI Committee, providing training and professional development opportunities to staff and volunteers, and advising the organization on strategies to strengthen DEI efforts. Thomas also provides an overview of DEI as a fundamental value at The Huntington during orientations for new staff members.

HR staff played greater roles in search committees, providing training and advice on best practices, including how to counter unconscious bias

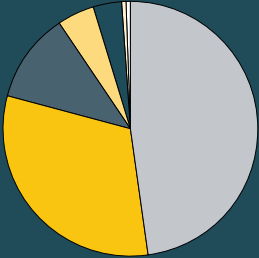

in hiring. HR staff also served on the search committees for management and leadership roles.

In addition to these improvements, Human Resources continued DEI training for all staff and volunteers. Thomas launched the DEI Dialogue series, which provides opportunities for staff to engage with DEI topics and guest speakers. The inaugural speaker was anti-racism activist and educator Tim Wise. Thomas also launched the first module of a three-part DEI training series for volunteers. Among the ongoing changes in office culture, staff may now designate their gender pronouns in the Workday human resources information system and add pronouns to work badges.

To chart the success of the institution’s DEI strategies, HR began conducting an annual demographic survey for staff. Statistics for full- and part-time staff as of June 30, 2023, are as follows:

- White: 48%
- Latina/o/x or Hispanic: 31.2%
- Asian: 11.4%
- Two or More Races: 4.7%
- Black or African American: 3.6%
- Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander: 0.7%
- American Indian or Alaska Native: 0.4%



VISITOR EXPERIENCE

Facilities continue to be reviewed and augmented to better accommodate diverse needs. For example, the number of all-gender restrooms expanded, including those in the newly renovated Rose Garden Tea Room. The DEI Committee implemented a language interpretation survey to assess the needs of staff and visitors, while Education staff continued to measure visitor demographics. During the 2023 fiscal year, approximately 52% of Huntington visitors identified as BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and people of color) and nearly 14% identified as members of the LGBTQ+ community. This data provides a baseline to measure the success of programs geared toward broader audiences.

Outreach, Partnership, and Community Engagement

Huntington staff and volunteers engaged with diverse populations and cultures while building partnerships with a range of cultural organizations. Education staff developed new points of access through tours for schools and the general public, online learning resources, and such enhanced visitor experiences as Family Day.

DEI COMMITTEE

The DEI Committee comprises staff from throughout the organization with diverse skills and perspectives. During the fiscal year, the Committee undertook a number of initiatives through eight working groups. Accomplishments included establishing processes and programs for internal recognition of heritage months. The DEI Lending Library, which offers culturally relevant books for staff to borrow, moved to locations around campus and increased the number of books in different languages. In addition, the Committee now offers recommendations for learning materials, films, and documentaries, and promotes awareness of local minority-owned businesses.

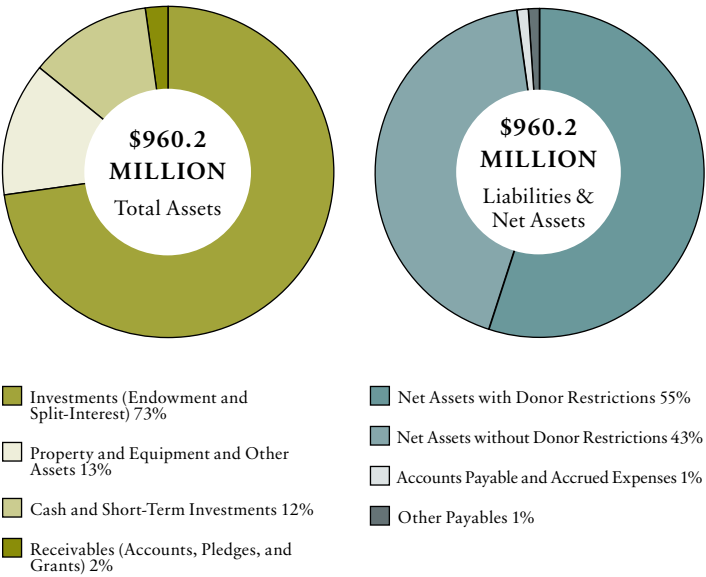

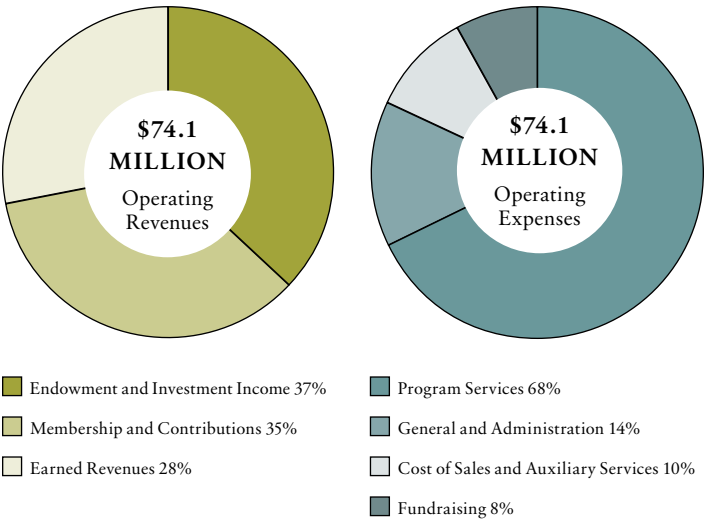

With more than 1 million visitors and 54,000 Member households, The Huntington sustained the momentum of the 2022 fiscal year. Despite rising inflation, volatility in capital markets, and severe winter storms, The Huntington ended the 2023 fiscal year with a balanced budget. The institution remained financially strong, benefiting from a healthy endowment, a diverse mix of growing revenue streams, and well-managed operating expenses.

Operating revenues for the 2023 fiscal year totaled \$74.1 million, up 15% from the previous fiscal year. Increased contributions, record-breaking sales at the Huntington Store, and income from renting Huntington facilities for outside events all contributed to this growth. These higher revenues offset a 15% increase in operating expenses, from \$64.5 million in the previous fiscal year to \$74.1 million (before depreciation expense). The increase was primarily a result of inflation, especially with regard to utilities, and greater labor costs.

The Huntington’s total assets as of June 30, 2023, were \$960 million, an increase from \$862 million the previous year. This was due mainly to a strong recovery in the endowment, attributable to 8.8% net investment returns for fiscal year 2023 and bequest contributions from longtime Huntington supporters. As of June 30, 2023, the endowment totaled \$705 million, up from \$614 million the previous year. The endowment is a vital resource, providing crucial funding for the annual operating budget. The Huntington draws 5% of the average endowment value across a 12-quarter timeframe to support annual operations. This policy helps to moderate the impact of major drops in the market, preventing them from severely impacting the institution.

On the heels of sustained momentum and with continued financial discipline, The Huntington is well positioned to fulfill its mission and advance ambitious strategic initiatives.

the year in fundraising

Donors contributed a phenomenal \$111 million in gifts, grants, and realized bequests, bolstering every facet of The Huntington’s mission. Of this total, \$22.4 million supported the operating budget. The Membership program, with support from more than 54,000 households, contributed \$8.9 million, and the Society of Fellows, a mainstay of yearly operational support for 50 years, contributed \$5 million. Both were record-breaking results for their respective programs. The Special Events team also had an outstanding year with \$1.5 million in revenue, which exceeded the department’s annual goal by 50%. Notably, donors leaving legacy gifts to The Huntington made an exceptional impact—just under \$83 million came from realized bequests and planned gifts, which are critical to the institution’s ongoing fiscal stability. Finally, fundraising results were punctuated by \$3.1 million for vital capital projects.

HIGHLIGHTS

Legacy Gifts

The Huntington received two exceptional bequests this fiscal year.

Jay T. Last, a dedicated Huntington supporter with a passion for art and humanities, left a transformative bequest of his lithographic print collection, vital restricted funding to support the Library, and critical unrestricted operating support.

Bernie and Miyako Storch, horticulturists and longtime Huntington volunteers, left an extraordinary legacy gift. This fiscal year, their estate distributed \$29.7 million to support the Botanical Gardens, including funding for biodiversity and sustainability programming as well as for a named curatorial position: the Bernie and Miyako Storch Curator of the Desert Garden and Collections.

In a remarkable year for planned giving at The Huntington, 20 households joined The Arabella and Henry Huntington Heritage Society by including the institution in their estate plans.

Art Acquisitions

This fiscal year, key supporters made several noteworthy art acquisitions possible. Exhibitions Support

Special gifts were made to support upcoming exhibitions. The Getty Foundation gave \$330,000 to support two exhibitions and their catalogs: “Storm Cloud: Picturing the Origins of Our Climate Crisis” and “Growing and Knowing in the Gardens of China.” These exhibitions will be part of the Getty Foundation’s “PST ART: *Art & Science Collide*” initiative in 2024.

Library Projects

The Library enjoyed significant acquisitions this fiscal year, notably the archive of Thomas Pynchon, supported by substantial gifts from two anonymous donors.

Significant gifts from two anonymous donor couples will support a future Library and Art building project.

Botanical Gardens

The Botanical Gardens benefitted from generous support, including a \$431,300 gift from Frank Mosher for the Japanese Heritage Shōya House and a \$250,000 grant from the Kenneth T. and Eileen L. Norris Foundation for the Desert Garden Entrance Project. Sherm and Marge Telleen made a gift of \$155,000 for the Jim Folsom Gardens Equipment Replacement Endowment.

The Chinese Garden received generous support from several donors. Lilon Meng made a \$200,000 donation for Chinese Garden programs and maintenance and named the Path of Ethereal Fragrance 幽芳小徑 in loving memory of Stella Meng.

EVENTS

Several special events celebrated The Huntington’s mission and philanthropic community this year.

On Sept. 10, the Huntington Ball, chaired by Lisa and Tim Sloan, returned for the first time since 2019. The evening served as the official conclusion to The Huntington’s Centennial celebrations.

Nearly 4,000 guests attended the annual Mid-Autumn Moon Celebration in August. The two-day event took place throughout the Chinese Garden, where attendees enjoyed live music, delicious food, and spectacular views of the garden’s pavilions, courtyards, and pathways at night.

The perennially popular “Strange Science” event took place in October. As part of “Strange Science: Into the Dark,” guests were treated to performances by LA Opera Connects and the Guild of St. George, as well as a special display of items from The Huntington’s collections and more.

Two annual events commemorated The Arabella and Henry Huntington Heritage Society, an honorary group of individuals who support The Huntington with legacy gifts. More than 115 guests attended the fall reception, and 155 guests enjoyed the spring luncheon, which featured a presentation by Erin Chase, associate curator of architecture and photography, titled “From the Ground Up: Building The Huntington’s Architecture Archive.”

The Huntington Art Gallery served as the location for Ralph Lauren’s first West Coast fashion show on Oct. 13, 2022. The landmark event included a runway show on the south terrace of the art gallery, followed by a specially themed dinner in the Rose Garden. Lauren ushered in a new line of fashion that was celebrated by a number of Hollywood stars, including Jennifer Lopez, Ben Affleck, John Legend, and Diane Keaton.

The Huntington’s two-day Chinese New Year Festival in February celebrated the Year of the Rabbit. The event featured lion dancers, martial arts performances, calligraphy demonstrations, and other family activities.

More than 550 guests gathered on June 2, 2023, for the ninth annual “An Evening Among the Roses,” a celebration of LGBTQ+ communities and their remarkable contributions to The Huntington. Highlights included performances by Mariachi Arcoiris de Los Angeles, personalized poems by Pride Poets, and an appearance by the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence.

Membership

The Huntington’s 54,000 Member households contributed \$8.9 million to the operating budget, an institutional milestone. Upper-level Members (Contributor through Benefactor) accounted for close to 30% of all Members, while Sustaining-level Member households remained steady at 38,000.
